How to file a complaint if you have been discriminated against when voting?

These are some of the examples of discrimination when voting:

- Prevent a citizen from voting because of their race, country of origin or religion.
- Requiring that a voter pass a reading test or demonstrate their knowledge of the United States. Constitution in order to vote.
- Requiring that someone who wants to register to vote to attend accompanied by a registered voter who can attest to their "good behavior".



How to file a complaint if you have been discriminated against when voting?

- You can also report any violation of your voter's rights before your state's general attorney, you can get in contact with GLAHR (770-457-5232) or contact your County Election Office.



Electoral fraud, voter intimidation and other electoral crimes.

Electoral fraud can be classified into three categories:

- Fraud related to financing of electoral campaigns: when candidates for a public political position accept donations that do not respect the amounts of money or sources allowed by law.
- Human Rights Violations include cases of voter intimidation, threats, and other forms of suppression of a person's right to vote.
- Voter registration fraud: when, for example, the name of a deceased person or someone who has moved to another state or country is used when registering to vote.

You can report any electoral fraud to your <u>state or local election</u> <u>office (in English)</u>. In most states this subject is covered by the Secretary of State.
